Criteria for Selecting Benchmarks

- 2. Benchmarks should be measures that are anticipated to move over time as a function of successful program implementation in one or more of the associated subdomains.
- 3. Benchmarks should be indicators of positive youth development that point to successful longer-term outcomes.

Criteria for Measures

- The measures included in the KOM are intended for broad use and have been normed on diverse samples.
- Demonstrated evidence for reliability (e.g., Cronbach's alpha > 0.70) and validity.
- Demonstrated evidence for validity, we include measures that are grounded in well-researched theoretical understandings of child and youth development and developed by area experts

Provider Focus Groups

- Measures potential partners are currently using and expect to use in the future
- Information that will be most useful for them in the KOM tool,
- Gauge their general capacity in measurement and evaluation.

- Outcome measures: which are tools that can be incorporated into program evaluation work to assess the effect of the program on its participants skills to explore whether their work has the intended impact on participating children.
- Screeners: brief assessments that are intended to flag children or youth who are risk of some negative outcome.
- Risk and protective factors: characteristics that have been associated with either a higher or lower likelihood of negative outcomes in a given domain.




